Poetic Devices

Eg- The poetry of earth

2. Repetition- Repeated use of words or phrases for emphasis.

Eg-hedge

3. Transferred Epithet- The use of an adjective with a noun when it refers to another noun.

Eg- pleasant weed, winter evening

4. Alliteration- The repetition of consonant sounds at the beginning of words in close proximity.

Eg- he has, grasshopper's among some grassy hills.

Poetic Devices

Eg- The street was wet with a recent snow.

<u>Simile-</u> A figure of speech that makes a comparison between two different things using 'like' or 'as.'

Eg- came the boys like a flock of sheep

<u>Alliteration-</u> The repetition of consonant sounds at the beginning of words in close proximity.

Eg- helping hand, hurt or harm.

<u>Transferred Epithet-</u> The use of an adjective with a noun when it refers to another noun.

Eg- merry troop, anxious eyes
