On a warm sunny October afternoon, you step through the gates of Shikshantar, amidst the hubbub of students from grades 1st through 8th, their families and friends. The area surrounding the 'Jupiter' is adorned with lights and buntings and the registration desks are set and ready to greet you. Behind the Baradari and Trinachiketa you find a pair of dragonflies made with huge leaves and rocks on the ground while vibrant colours, lights and sounds invite you to explore the world of insects. As you move ahead you realize that this was just the tip of the iceberg- and that your journey into the Hamara Mela has just begun.

The programme started off with the diya lighting ceremony and songs sung by 3rd and 4th grade students. After an enlightening speech by Minoti didi, all the visitors diverged to their choice of stalls and grades, with a large fraction of this group to be found perpetually at the food stalls at later times. The junior block, or I block was a menagerie of colours, sounds and sights as the younger students presented the folk dances and arts of India, with ragas being played and sung with the harmonium, dholak, maracas and tambourine.

Guests could, in this certain area, also make their own embroidery pieces, while the front lawns were home to stalls teeming with creativity, inviting people to dabble in sand art, mandala making and water art. And then left to the visitor's choice was to either get lost in the performances of the students of 1st and 2nd grade on the mound or in the puzzling, mathematical maze made by the students of the same classes.

The centre of I- block was full of engaging quizzes about India's geography and culture as well as games from olden times.

As one moved towards the older classes, in K block, they entered a different world altogether. 

# THE PATH AHEAD

Our school's "Path Ahead," is a comprehensive programme that works at guiding high school students towards making higher education choices at different milestones of their journey in school. Path Ahead includes reflection exercises, panel discussions, interactive sessions with universities and sessions with the in-house University Admissions Team, led by Garima Didi.

This year we had a mix of in-person as well as online interactions with university representatives. The sessions were opened for different classes depending upon their relevance. The university representation began on 27th July with an interactive session which was organized for interested students and parents of Classes X to XII. The session provided an opportunity to our students who are interested in studying visual arts related courses after Class XII to interact with the representative of School of Visual Arts, New York. More recently, an interactive session was held for interested students of Classes XI and XII with a Mathematics Professor from University of Waterloo, wherein children were introduced to the concepts of game theory, probability and their practical applications in the world of Business and Economics. Additionally, information regarding virtual as well as in-person outreach programs by various universities were also shared like a Meet Up Session on HKU-UCB Dual Degree Programme, Know Your Major sessions by Ahmedabad University, UCLA's information session etc.

On 26th October, we had five presentations. The first was a representative from Education USA. She explained to us how we should go about applying in the USA, the tests we need to take, and the requirements. Next, we met the representative from the UK, who similarly told us about the UK application process. We had a representative from Canada, followed by New Zealand, and lastly from the University of Ahmedabad. These sessions were very informative and will be extremely helpful for us in the college application process.

The next part of the programme is the University representation—an interactive session conducted by colleges and educational institutes from all over the world, exclusively for students in classes IX to XII. Held on 27th October, in this session we learned about and interacted with representatives from various educational institutes and organizations. The session took place in the multipurpose hall, where there were numerous different colleges from all over India as well as abroad. We could go and speak to any representative we wanted and get to know more about the college, the courses it has to offer, how the campus is, tuition fees, scholarships, etc. The parents could also interact with college representatives since this would ideally be a collective decision.

Throughout the year, we have had sessions with Garima Didi, who guides us through the reflection exercises and the college application process for different countries. In these sessions, we are informed about the deadlines for things that the school would issue, such as the letter of recommendation or the predicted scores.

All of us have dreams that we want to achieve, and "Path Ahead" brings us closer to them. Events like these are crucial in a high school student's life, and "Path Ahead" acts as a reality check, reminding us of what we have accomplished and all that is yet to be done before we start college. Overall, 'Path Ahead' is an expounding session that introduces high school students to the higher education processes. It helps the children figure out viable options for their further studies and makes them feel a little less intimidated and overwhelmed by the university admissions procedure.

Shikshantar school hosted its first ever edition of The Iris '23 - a literary festival encompassing various inter school events. It took place on the 30th of October, 2023.


#### **ORIGIN**




# Sattal 23'
