protection that should be provided to journalists reporting about conflicts. Russia meanwhile reaffirms the subject by saying that Russia





Parliament and Privacy

Parties wage war over the DPDP Act and its context in India

Manish Tiwari's impassioned speech begins with a narrative, as he reminds the committee of the RTI Act, which was passed when the Congress was in power. He claims that the Act's incentive to protect the privacy of the citizens of India was overshadowed by the BJP's inability to perceive any actions of the Congress as correct or important to the growth of the country, and so, the DPDP Act was passed.

He reminds the committee of the loopholes in the DPDP Act that could prove fatal to the protection of the privacy of the citizens. However, his credibility burnt a hole when Amit Shah raised a POI reminding the committee that the loopholes 'present' in the DPDP are reflected in the RTI Act as well. He turns the POI around by pointing out that he speaks not of the loopholes themselves, but their potentially fatal consequences currently. This leaves the committee slightly unsure as to his arguments- do they truly hold up?

On the flip side, Narendra Modi tries to play the role of the mediator. He uses his time to mention the similarities between the RTI Act and the DPDP Act. He outlines how they both strive to protect the privacy of the citizens and their data. However, this seems to come off as an oversimplification. A POI is raised, bringing up the fact that the RTI aims to open up a door for transparency between the government and the citizens, and the former's handling of private data, while the DPDP Act provides a way for the government to hide the same. This POI overturns the mediatory speech delivered by Modi- such legislative matters cannot be simplified as such.

The contrast between the RTI Act and the DPDP Act is one that each party tries to spin to their advantage. Ultimately, the matter of digital privacy is one that is pivotal to the government of any country, and the importance of the same is proved by the passionate speeches of the members of the Lok Sabha. But each individualistically rooted member stands their ground, and a decision proves to be no closer.

"Yeah, I know, but at least there's someone defending us in their battle."



The ESL: End Foot ball?

It all started with a simple idea. All problems do. Florentino Perez, The President of Real Madrid, has had his fair share of controversy in the recent past. However, none of them even come close to the European Super League fiasco. In 2009, Real Madrid were in a rebuilding phase, after the end of the famous "Galacticos" era. Perez realised the club was in dire need of funds. That is when the idea of the "ESL" emerged in his mind. In 2018, Perez started to hold formal discussions with the presidents of other clubs who might be interested in the idea. However, it was not met with much interest. The Covid-19 pandemic changed everything. All clubs took heavy blows to their finances, as the games were stopped for months, and when they finally resumed, the generation of revenue had taken a hit due to no possibility of ticket sales. In 2021, twelve of Europe's biggest clubs came together to establish a new mid-week competition, the Super League. This included 6 English clubs, 3 Italian clubs and 3 Spanish ones.

As of 22nd December 2023, just Barcelona and Real Madrid are the remaining advocates for the formation of "ESL". It is common knowledge that
