CH-3: Malgudi Cricket Club

Theme: The main theme of '*The Umbrella Man*' by Roald Dahl is deception. Through this, Dahl shows that people are not always what they seem, and even well-mannered individuals can have dishonest intentions. The story also uses irony to add a humorous twist, revealing the unexpected outcome of a seemingly simple encounter.

CH-6: Somebody's Mother

Theme: Theme of this poem is that we should always be unselfish and help others. The main feature of this poem is to have compassion and kindness for others like the young boy had for the old woman. It leaves the reader with a thought-provoking message and a good feeling in the heart to help who are in need.

Poetic Devices

1. Repetition- Repeated use of words or phrases for emphasis.

Eg- woman, boy.

2. Imagery- Imagery uses a vivid description that appeals to a reader's senses to create an image in their head.

Eg- The street was wet with a recent snow.

3. Simile- A figure of speech that makes a comparison between two different things using 'like' or 'as.'

Eg- came the boys like a flock of sheep

4. Alliteration- The repetition of consonant sounds at the beginning of words in close proximity.

Eg- helping hand, hurt or harm.

5. Transferred Epithet- The use of an adjective with a noun when it refers to another noun.

Eg- merry troop, anxious eyes
