

## WHO World Health Organization

I bring to you the crux of the deliberation over the proceedings of the debate between different countries on novel corona virus and the impact on all the countries over the world.

"Although our main concern is to treat people with substance use disorder and mental health issues and to ultimately prepare them for reintegration into society, vaccination is crucial in terms of ensuring overall health and well-being."

There is broad agreement within the global scientific community that the most effective way to defeat the COVID-19 pandemic is through mass vaccination of population around the world. The development of vaccines for COVID-19 has been a powerful demonstration of how substantial public funding, intense focus, and unprecedented levels of scientific collaboration can help spur innovation to address global public needs in a very short time.

However, the approval and rollout of vaccines does not herald the immediate end of the health crisis, as attaining herd immunity will require the vaccination of a very substantial proportion of population and is therefore a major challenge. A deliverance by delegate of Iceland left the committee all ears as it necessitated upon the breakdown on the necessity of vaccination.

While the committee expediated the need of an integrated, comprehensive and actionable framework, delegate of Italy essentialized taking into consideration the impact of novel corona virus taking toll on poorer countries, black marketing and hoarding of vaccines and medicines and suggested some measures imposed to prevent the same.

### **AIPPM**



Many opposition leaders criticised the Central Government for exporting vaccines to other nations in a reply to which the Union Minister said "Only 1/3rd of 17 crore vaccines were exported abroad". The fact that 6.6 crores vaccines were exported abroad is mind boggling. Priyanka Gandhi remarked that the Prime Minister is responsible for exporting vaccines.The former Health Minister said. "The Indian Government has done really well till now in vaccine distribution. India has vaccinated twice the number US has vaccinated". But only 8.3% of the total population of India is fully vaccinated in India compared to the USA which has fully vaccinated 50.7% of total population. The vaccination policy created chaos as first the vaccine distribution responsibility was under the Central Government. Then it changed its policy and distribution of vaccines was given to states. Again April end, the Central Government changed its policy. Because of this chaos, very less supply of vaccines were received by the states.

The Central Government is educating the rural people regarding the vaccine and it is taking action against the black marketing of vaccines. Yogendra Yadav who himself supports the farmers protest said "Farmers are still protesting at the borders and the third wave is not so far."

## UNCSW United Nations Comission on Status of Women By Saranya Sridhar

Member nations were in consensus about the elephant in the room that is the pandemic was not gender neutral in the influence it had. Women were left to bear the brunt of social, political, financial and emotional backlash. It is especially reflected in domestic abuse, every one out of three woman suffers. The delegate of Nigeria reported a rise of 56% in domestic violence against women while the delegate of New Zealand argued that the laws necessary for lockdowns and COVID containment aggravated the hard pressed situations of woman behind closed doors. The delegate of Germany shined a light on the plight of beleaguered single mothers as they struggled to bring food to the table while facing unemployment and discrimination in high paying sectors. Determined not to dwell on problems the members suggested numerous solutions and implementations that suggested an optimistic future. These solutions included integration of women in administrative decision making stressed by nations with female heads of state like Estonia and New Zealand, furthermore on specific targets like domestic abuse free hotlines and counseling mediums were highly advised. There was also a focus on NGO's [Non-Governmental Organizations] which caused a short furore as Germany refused to provide monetary aids to these groups saying their aim was not profit. Other exhortations include updated medical facilities, education from a young age, income support measures, and even advancing the political agency of women.



## Proliferation of biochemical weapons with special emphasis on COVID 19

According to the definition given by WHO, biological weapons are "microorganisms like virus, bacteria, fungi or other toxins that are produced and released deliberately to cause disease and death in humans, animals or plants". They are one of the four most deadly weapons of mass destruction. A biological weapon has three components- a biological agent, some additives to support the stability and dissemination of the agent, and a delivery system. As per the reports, the MRCA of all coronaviruses is estimated to have existed as recently as 8000 BCE, although some models place the common ancestor as far back as 55 million years or more inculcating long term evolution with bat and avian species. On 11 February 2020, The International Committee on Taxonomy of Viruses adopted the official name "severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2" [SARS-CoV-2].



A biological attack can potentially result in an epidemic, therefore creating a massive disruption in the society and complicating the response of health authorities. The Corornavirus has also seen the spread of disinformation and conspiracy theories regarding the intentional nature of the virus allegedly manipulated in a laboratory similar to a biological weapon. Theories also propose that a new era of biological weapons is generated through coronavirus. As history suggests, the United States and the Soviet Union invested considerable resources in bio weapon programmes. Even so they struggled to develop functional weapons able to withstand a range of environmental conditions let alone be of strategic use. Biological weapons are unique in their ability to inflict large number of casualties over a wide area with minimal logistics requirements and by means which can be virtually untraceable. One of the biggest disadvantages of biological warfare is its nature of being unpredictable. There have been recorded incidents of infecting own troops.



### WOMEN IN THE PANDEMIC WORLD

The impact of crisis is never gender-neutral, and COVID-19 is no exception. While everyone is facing unprecedented challenges, women are bearing the brunt of the economic and social fallout of Covid-19. Women who are poor and marginalized face even higher risk of transmission of Covid-19, loss of livelihood, and increased violence. Governments all over the world are struggling to contain this pandemic. The effect of pandemic is hitting women the hardest. While the economic and social impact on all are severe, they are more so for women. Many of the industries in the formal economy, directly affected by quarantine and lockdown. Travel, tourism, restaurants and food production sectors have very high female labor force participation. At the same time, they typically shoulder greater burden of care. On average, women did three times as much unpaid care work as men at home before Covid-19. Formal sector female employees with children are balancing one or more work such as childcare, elder care and housework. Secondly, the crisis has an impact on women's health and safety as well. Apart from the direct impact of the disease, women may find it hard to access much needed maternal health services. Women's personal safety is also at risk. Finally, because the majority of frontline workers especially nurses are women, their risk of infection is higher.

For the improvement in the condition of women, globally, the governments are taking the appropriate measures but they should ensure that the needs of female nurses and doctors are integrated into every aspect of response effort. This means ensuring menstrual hygiene products are available for female care givers and frontline responders as a part of the personal protective equipment. Furthermore, they need to ensure that hotlines and services for all victims of domestic abuse are considered "essential services'. Also, a leader must find a way to include women in response and recovery decision making. Finally, policy makers must pay attention to what is happening in people's home and support an equal sharing of burden of care between women and men. There is a great opportunity to unlearn the stereotypes attached with gender roles. These actions and more are urgent. Building the needs of women offers an opportunity for us to "Build Back Better".
