Poem 7: On Killing A Tree

Poetic Devices

- Metaphor: The tree represents nature, and the act of killing it symbolizes environmental destruction.
- Personification: The tree is given human-like qualities, as if it can feel pain ("bleeding bark").
- Repetition: Words like "no" and "so" are repeated to emphasize the persistence of the tree.
- Enjambment: The sentences run over from one line to the next without a pause, creating a natural flow, mirroring the tree's growth.
- Alliteration: The use of similar sounds like in "bleeding bark" and "white and wet" adds musicality to the poem.
