- 1. It is generally accepted that leadership development should be a part of the education system's responsibility for preparing individuals to participate in a democratic and progressive society. Many schools, colleges and universities across nations, provide their students with leadership courses, curricular programs and co-curricular programs that are designed to develop students' formal knowledge about leadership as well as opportunities and experiences to develop students as leaders and actually practice leadership. Yet, only a handful of studies have sought to understand leader development from the students' point of view, with students describing their own experiences and what they learned from them in their own words.
- 2. A 2014 descriptive study sought to understand student leadership with research through key events via the following research questions:
 - Research Question 1: What key events do student leaders in college, report as significantly impacting their development as a leader?
 - Research Question 2: What lessons do student leaders in college, report learning as a result of the key events that they have experienced?
 - Research Question 3: Are certain key events more likely to be linked to particular lessons?

Approximately 130 students were contacted and the 72 interested, were interviewed. Two members of the research team were present for each 15-45 minutes interview. One member served as the primary interviewer, while the second ran the audio equipment. The results for lessons learned (Table), were varied, but there were a few that were frequently quoted.

- 1. Like a computer that slows with use, the brain accumulates wear and tear that affects processing. This can be caused by a number of physiological stressors such as inflammation, injury to blood vessels (especially if you have high blood pressure), the buildup of abnormal proteins, and naturally occurring brain shrinkage.
- 2. The following factors can also affect your concentration.

Underlying conditions. Depression or sleep disorders can undermine your ability to concentrate. So can the effects of vision or hearing loss. You waste precious cognitive resources when you spend too much time trying to make out what's written on a page or just hear what someone is saying.

3. **Medication side effects**. Some drugs, especially anticholinergics (such as treatments for incontinence, depression, or allergies), can slow processing speed and your ability to think clearly.

- 4. Excessive drinking. Having too much alcohol impairs thinking and causes interrupted sleep, which affects concentration.
- 5. **Information overload.** We are bombarded with information from TVs, computers, and messages such as texts or emails. When there's too much material, it burdens our filtering system and it's easy to get distracted.
- 6. To improve attention, consider the following strategies.

Mindfulness. "Mindfulness is about focusing attention on the present moment, and practicing mindfulness has been shown to rewire the brain so that attention is stronger in everyday life," says Kim Willment, a neuropsychologist with Brigham and Women's Hospital. She recommends sitting still for a few minutes each day, closing your eyes, and focusing on your breathing as well as the sounds and sensations around you.

- 7. **Cognitive training.** Computerized cognitive training games aim to improve your response time and attention. Evidence that this works has been mixed. "The goal of playing these games is not to get better at them, but to get better in the cognitive activities of everyday life," Willment says. "But there is evidence that a person's ability to pay attention can be improved by progressively pushing the person to higher levels of performance."
- 8. A healthier lifestyle. Many aspects of a healthy lifestyle can help with attention, starting with sleep and exercise. When you exercise, you increase the availability of brain chemicals that promote new brain connections, reduce stress, and improve sleep. And when we sleep, we reduce stress hormones that can be harmful to the brain, and we clear out proteins that injure it. Aim for seven to eight hours of sleep each night, and 150 minutes per week of aerobic exercise, such as brisk walking.

But things really took off when 18th-century nobles realised it was a great sport.
- 3. The oldest surviving set of cricket laws dates to 1744, which was printed on a handkerchief. Naturally, it's now in the MCC Museum at Lord's in London. The oldest permanent fixture is the annual Eton vs. Harrow match, played since 1805. A young Lord Byron turned out for Harrow in the first match, though history doesn't record how poetic or "mad, bad, and dangerous" his bowling was.
- 4. The first international match was held in 1877 when Australia beat England in Melbourne. The match was dubbed a 'Test' since the gruelling nature of playing over five days was deemed the ultimate test for any side. However, it was Australia's first win on the English soil in 1882 at The Oval in London that led to matches between the two nations being christened as the 'Ashes'. Following the defeat, newspapers published an obituary mourning "the death of English cricket", adding that "the body will be cremated and the ashes taken to Australia."

- 5. A One Day International (ODI) is a form of limited overs cricket, played between two teams with international status, in which each team faces a fixed number of overs, usually 50. The Cricket World Cup is played in this format. The international one-day game is a late twentieth-century development. The first ODI was played on 5 January 1971 between Australia and England at the Melbourne Cricket Ground.
