Silk Road

THEME

POETIC DEVICES

- Alliteration: The repetition of consonant sounds, such as in "silence surrounds us," emphasizes the emotional distance between the father and son.
- Enjambment: The poem uses enjambment, where one-line flows into the next without a pause, reflecting the continuous stream of thoughts and the father's internal conflict.

- Repetition: Words like "father" and "son" are repeated to stress the relationship and the tension between the two.
- Imagery: The poem uses visual imagery, such as "silence surrounds us," to evoke a sense of isolation and emotional distance between father and son.
